Preparing for Fall 2020

The emergence of the coronavirus (COVID-19) has definitely changed everyone's lives. At the College, we remain vigilant in continuing to provide quality instruction during the midst of the pandemic. The safety of our students, faculty, and staff is top priority, and in order to provide face-to-face instruction,

the College has implemented a number of procedures to keep everyone safe on campus:

- -All faculty, staff, students, and visitors are required to wear a face covering on campus and in buildings, with a few exceptions, such as students in their dorm rooms, alone in a study room, staff in their offices, and in an outdoor space with adequate room.
- -Reminders about physical distancing, wearing face coverings, and the maximum occupancy limit of certain areas are posted throughout campus.
- -Common areas in buildings, such as restrooms, handrails, push bars, and door handles are cleaned on a daily basis.
- -Hand sanitizing stations are located in each building.
- -Work accommodations have been made for employees who are high risk, immunocompromised, or have other concerns.
- -Classroom instruction is being delivered in-person, online, and also in hybrid formats. Hybrid formats include courses where on one day a portion of students attend class in-person, while the rest participate online, then the groups of students switch on a different day.
- -Classrooms have been reconfigured and section sizes reduced to allow for social distancing.
- -In relation to dining services, masks/face coverings and social distancing requirements are still in place. Face coverings may be removed when seated at tables while eating.
